A longstanding member of the English Baroque Soloists, he played a major role in John Eliot Gardiner's Bach Cantata cycle in 2000, performing the organ obbligato of BWV 146 on the Trost organ in Altenburg.

He has published research on the string music of Purcell and Handel's compositional process. As a composer and arranger, his works have been performed and recorded by Fretwork, The Bach Players and the David Gordon Trio.
